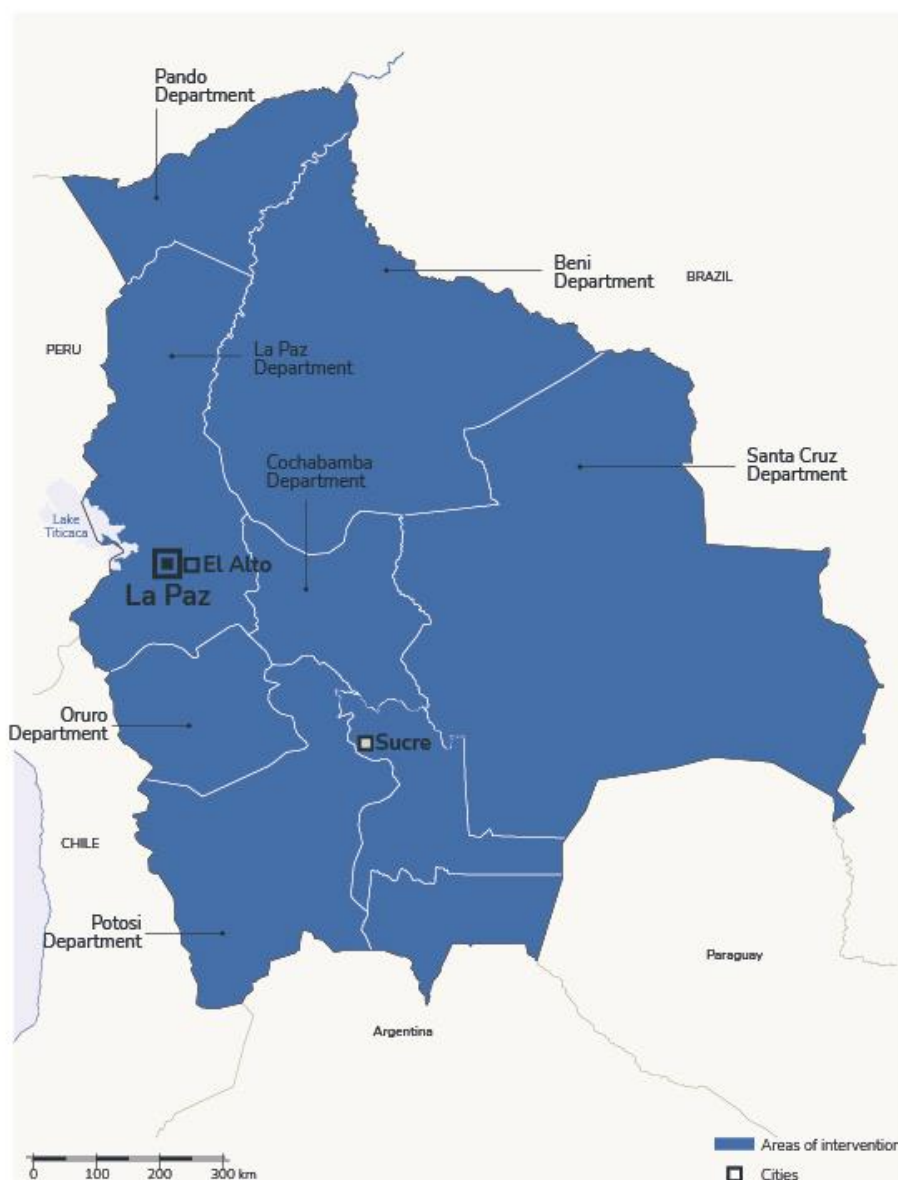

c) Geopolitical analysis

As a middle-income country, Bolivia remains one of Latin America's poorest nations. Bolivia's first indigenous president, Evo Morales, was first elected in 2005. Since then,



progress has been made in the areas of poverty reduction, education, health, recognition and inclusion of the country's 36 ethnic groups and indigenous cultures.

Despite this progress, the economic model implemented in Bolivia, based on extractivism, has failed in many aspects and is not meeting the basic needs of the population. Bolivia still ranks highest in percentages of poverty (38.6%) and extreme poverty (16.8%), teenage pregnancies, violence against women, etc. Limitations are observed in the quality of health and education services, increased citizen insecurity, high rate of unemployment, particularly in youth.

Bolivia is regularly affected by natural disasters and effects of climate change on agricultural activity are already visible, upsetting the economy of the country.



Summary of HI presence in the country

HI initiated activities in Bolivia in 2011 implementing an inclusive local development project in the department of Potosí with a local NGO, Ayninakuna until the end of 2013.

Between 2014 and 2016, the HI program thrived with 3 projects:

1. Support to establishing seven pilot rehabilitation centers in two of the country's poorest regions, aimed at supporting the national strategy.
2. Access to decent work for persons with disabilities and parents in the Municipality of El Alto.
3. Inclusive disaster risk management in the departments of Potosí, Oruro and La Paz.

As of 2017, the following projects were implemented: "Nationwide scaling up of rehabilitation centers" (7 of the 9 departments of Bolivia) and "Access to decent work for persons with disabilities and parents in the municipalities of El Alto and La Paz (funded by DGD, 2017-2021). Other projects implemented during this period included: Developing accessible, comprehensive and quality rehabilitation services for all throughout the country (financed by UNICEF) and Sexual and Reproductive Health (financed by UNFPA).

For the period 2020 -2022, HI also implemented the project: "Community-based strategy with an inclusive approach for the prevention and care of violence against women", financed by World Bank and implemented in consortium with the IISEC (Insitituto de investigaciones socio economicas) and the Centro de Promoción de la Mujer Gregoria Apaza.

In 2023, 3 projects are being implemented:

1. **Improve the health status of children and adolescents from 0 to 18 years old with disabilities or at risk of developing a disability, in a comprehensive approach**, in the departments of Santa Cruz and La Paz in Bolivia (financed by DGD, 2022- February 2023).
2. **Strengthening national and local health, nutrition and child development strategies, with emphasis on early childhood population with disabilities** (financed by UNICEF, 2022-2023).
3. **Technical assistance in inclusion:** situational diagnosis of vulnerable groups for the implementation of good inclusion practices in the project: Resilience for people and biodiversity in the Iténez PD IMNA, Rio Blanco Ramsar site. (Financed by WWF, July 2023)
