


Geopolitical analysis

Social, cultural and demographic context

Morocco is a unitary parliamentary constitutional monarchy with a regionalised structure. Rabat is the Kingdom's capital. The Moroccan population consists mainly of Berbers, Arabs, Moriscos and Haratins from the south. The official languages are Arabic and Amazigh and the working languages are Darija Arabic, Amazigh (the language of the Berbers) and French throughout the country and Spanish in the northern regions. According to figures from the General Population and Housing Census carried out in September 2024, Morocco has a population of 36,828,330 (including 36,680,178 Moroccans and 148,152 foreigners). In 2017, 43% of the



population was under the age of 25.

Contexte politique

At the international level, Morocco continues to position itself as a bridge between Europe and Africa, developing its economic, commercial, security and diplomatic relations with the European Union while being particularly active on the African continent with, in particular, its re-entry into the African Union in 2016 and its application for membership of ECOWAS (the community of West African States) in 2017. In 2021, it developed closer links with the United States and the State of Israel.

Economic situation

Following growth of 3.4% in 2023, GDP slowed to 2.4% in the first half of 2024, mainly due to a contraction in the agricultural sector, with cereal production falling by 43% due to drought. Non-agricultural growth held steady at 3.3%. Domestic demand showed signs of acceleration, with private consumption and gross capital formation rising by 3.1% and 6.7% respectively in the first half of 2024, supported by a sharp drop in annual inflation from 10.1% at the start of 2023 to 1.7% in August 2024.

The predominant agricultural sector (15% of GDP) remains highly dependent on the vagaries of the weather, especially drought, despite the launch in 2008 of the Green Morocco Plan to develop agriculture and its added value. The country has few mineral resources, with the exception of phosphate (72.4% of the world's phosphate reserves).

The region's proximity to Europe has led to the development of an industrial sector based mainly on the automotive, textile and agro-food industries. The tertiary sector benefits principally from the expansion of tourism-related activities (despite being severely impacted by COVID-19), trade and telecommunications and customer relations services. In terms of economic growth, Morocco has made significant progress in several areas over the last two decades.

Three regions produce more than half of the country's national wealth and are among the most important in terms of generating added value in the primary sector (Rabat Salé Kenitra region), secondary sector (Casablanca Settat, Rabat Salé Kenitra and Tangier Tetouan Al Hoceima regions) and tertiary sector (the same regions). These are also the regions with the greatest recruitment needs.

The COVID-19 pandemic brought national growth to a temporary halt, resulting in major job losses and putting severe pressure on the labour market in a country with one of the lowest labour force participation rates in the world. The Ukrainian crisis, coupled with cereal production issues caused by drought have led to high inflation driven by rising fuel prices, despite an ongoing policy of subsidising basic necessities.

Summary of HI's work in the country

Present in Morocco since 1993, HI is one of the few INGOs to have signed a Headquarters Agreement with the Moroccan Ministry of Cooperation and Foreign



Affairs (1999). Our organisation's historical roots are reflected in our strong network of partnerships with Organisations of People with Disabilities (OPD), supported for over 20 years to develop their capacity for self-representation and action.

Since 2011, in a context of reforms, HI Morocco has been working closely with the authorities to foster the development and implementation of inclusive public policies. The programme has also progressively extended its collaboration to include the private sector by helping companies to include people with disabilities in the workplace, particularly young people, as well as to new civil society organisations to help meet the needs of other vulnerable groups, such as women who have been victims of discrimination and migrant people.

After the earthquake in September 2023, HI broadened its response to include emergency needs in the fields of physical and functional rehabilitation and mental health.
