

## **Geopolitical analysis**

#### Social/cultural/demographic elements

Sierra Leone is bordered by Guinea on the North, Liberia in the South-East and the Atlantic Ocean in the South-West. The country became independent on April 27th, 1961, after having been a British colony since 1792. It was ravaged by a civil war that lasted from 1991 to 2002 and resulted in some 70,000 casualties and 2.6 million displaced people. Since 2002, the country has slowly rebuilt and restored order.



About 16 ethnic groups inhabit in Sierra Leone. Although English is the official language spoken at schools and government administration, the Krio language is the most widely spoken language in the country. Sierra Leone is among the 10% of countries in the world that are most vulnerable to the adverse consequences of climate change, and presently one of the least able to cope with the effects. Unpredictable weather patterns, severe flooding, mudslides, and associated crop failure are becoming more frequent, even as the country is witnessing cut down at a faster rate than being planted. Also due to high dependence of agriculture and natural resources, high rates of poverty and unemployment, and environmental degradation (extreme precipitation and sea level rise increasingly threatens coastal areas with flooding and erosion).

#### Political context

General elections were held in Sierra Leone on the 24<sup>th</sup> June 2023 to elect the president, members of parliament and local councils. The incumbent president Julius Maada Bio was re-elected with 56% of the vote and the Sierra Leone People's party won 81 seats in parliament compared to the main opposition party, the All-People's Congress, which won 54 seats. The result was contested by the All-People's Congress, which demanded a return, citing "glaring irregularities". European election observers stated that there was "statistical inconsistence" in the presidential results published, with the European Union Election Observation Mission saying that the election commission should "publish disaggregated results data per polling station to allow for public scrutiny of the results". Unless that happened, it said that transparency was compromised. Because of this, there has been tension and disagreement between the two political parties. The opposition party has boycotted their seats in parliament and local councils.

A pollical dialogue was initiated under the aegis of the African Union and ECOWAS and led to the signature of the "Agreement of National Unity" on October 18th. Part of the agreement was the formation of a Tripartite Committee in order to promote national unity and reviewing critical elements such as election results and electoral processes. International bodies like the Commonwealth, African Union, ECOWAS, and the U.S. government supported the committee's formation, with \$1.5 million from the U.S. aiding its operations. The primary goal was to resolve disagreements related to polling station results, some of which were contested or missing, and ensure transparency in the electoral process. Following the attacks on Wilberforce Barack in November 2023, which the Minister of Information latter referred to as a failed coup d'etat, the political situation in Freetown was in state of heightened tension. In relation to this, on the 3<sup>rd</sup> of January 2024, four charges were filed against the former president Ernest Bai Koroma, a member of the APC party, including treason, misprision of treason and the crime of harboring. The former president was found guilty and has been exile to Nigeria as pleaded by the ECOWAS community rather than to be imprison in Sierra Leone.

This situation remains a significant political crisis in Sierra Leone, with implications for the country's electoral integrity and governance.



#### **Economic elements**

Real GDP growth declined to 3.4% in 2023 from 3.5% in 2022. This was primarily attributed to subdued aggregate demand and socio-political stability concerns. Growth was driven by the mining export (iron ore) on the demand side and by the recovery in key sector on the supply side, inflation rose to 27% in 2022 to 46.6% in 2023, driven by food and fuel prices, depreciation of the Leone and supply-side constraints. The fiscal deficit declined to an estimated 5.8% of GDP from 9.6% in 2022. Public debt is estimated to have declines from 98.8% of GDP in 2022 to an estimated 90.5% of GDP in 2023. The country remains at high risk of debt distress. The current account deficit narrowed to an estimate of 8.3% of GDP in 2022 to 6.1% in 2023, reflecting an increase in export and grants.

Gross foreign reserves stood at \$432.9 million in October 2023. The depreciation of the Leone moderated from 39.1% in 2022 to 17.2% in 2023 due to lifted foreign exchange market. non-performing loans Sierra Leone is characterized by high poverty (25% in 2023), youth employment was 10% in 2022, but underemployment is much higher.

# Summary of HI presence in the country

In 1996, HI launched its first activities in the country with the opening of a rehabilitation center in Bo. Since then, HI has been instrumental in building the foundation of rehabilitation work, promoting the agenda of inclusive education, inclusive economy, protection, disaster risk reduction (DRR), sexual reproductive health and rights and mental health in Sierra Leone through various projects. Besides, HI has also responded to one of the largest emergencies, Ebola outbreak', followed by mudslide in 2017 and COVID-19 pandemic. Since its first mission in 1996, HI has reach out to tens of thousands of people including people with disabilities, girls, children, gender-based violence survivors and women who needed the support to alleviate the sufferings due to lack of access to services and social injustice.
